All things considered, the residents of Weeting are keeping the village clean and tidy and we have our regular Wombles who collect up the loose detritus from the verges and green areas. Thanks to you all.

HOWEVER, it is a shame that a few selfish people must spoil it for everyone else.

Overnight, between Tuesday 24th & Wednesday 25th August, several black bin sacks containing household waste were left in and around the small bin next to the bus shelter at Park View. This was less than 24 hours after the regular household waste collection by Serco! Perhaps the person responsible for dumping this had forgotten to put their green bin out in time, but that is NOT an excuse for leaving it for someone else to organise its collection at public expense. **SO**, **SHAME ON YOU!**

Breckland District Council have been made aware of the rubbish and Serco will have to send out a truck to pick it up at a cost to us all. **Be aware that Fly Tipping is illegal.** They sift through the bags and will prosecute the perpetrator if they can identify them from the contents. Just recently someone in Thetford was identified after fly tipping and was fined £400.

Another thing to bear in mind – if Mr X pays a "Man with a Van" to take away his unwanted rubbish and it gets dumped in a field, or on the roadside, Mr X **will** be prosecuted if identified and the chances are that "Man in a Van" will be untraceable. Always make sure you check that "Man in a Van" is licensed to carry away the rubbish and can guarantee it will go to a bona fide collection centre.

The litter bins around the village are meant for just that – litter - small items of rubbish, such as sweet wrappers etc., not bags and boxes of unwanted household items. More items are often left around the clothing banks and these are also reported as fly tipping. Please use your household bins or go to the nearest recycling centres – either Thetford or Mildenhall.

One last plea – if you are out and about, why not take your rubbish home with you and put it in the appropriate bin? If the clothing banks are full, please report them on 01507 466159 or 07903 009234.

Saving St Mary's

I am sure that most of you are aware that our village church is in dire need of some tender loving care. Over the past few years it has seen structural degradation inside the south porch and gradual subsidence of the floor under the pews on the south side to the extent that it is now considered unsafe to use this side of the church. Added to



that, we had the lead over the Lady Chapel roof stolen, causing rainwater to gain entry.

Whilst the Lady Chapel roof has now been made watertight, the cost for the rest of the repairs needed runs into tens of thousands of pounds and there is no magic fund from the Diocese forthcoming. Therefore, it is down to the village to find a way forward.

Whether you are a churchgoer or not, you cannot escape the fact that St Mary's is a major part of our village history and identity. Once upon a time we had two churches in Weeting. All Saint's, built in 1309, stood next to the site of the present village hall, with a square tower at the west end. Unfortunately, this tower collapsed in 1701 and the building, left open to the elements, eventually fell apart.


St Mary's may be even older than All Saint's as there is evidence of 11th and 12th century origins along with some 14th century work. The chancel is of the Decorated period (1250 -1350) and the nave windows on the south side are of the Perpendicular



period (1350 - 1520). Many alterations were made during the 1800's, including the construction of a crypt beneath the church by the Angersteins, and the round 'Normanesque' tower was added in 1868.

The church is Grade II listed and therefore considered to be a building "of special interest, warranting every effort to preserve it." Therefore, we really need to come up with some ideas about how we can fund raise in earnest. If there is anyone reading this who is prepared to try to source grant monies or has any sound suggestions, please contact Rev. Joan Horan.

In the meantime, please support the forthcoming events such as the Mad Hatter's Tea Party (see opposite in the Bowls Club report). The recent Village Quest event was successful with eight teams entering and a profit of over £120 was raised, so well done to those who took part and all those who organised it.



Rector's Report St Dary's Church

As our lives are 'waking up' from lockdown hibernation it has been good to be out and about again, even if August hasn't been quite the warm balmy weather we might have liked. Lots of us have been holidaying closer to home given the uncertainties around venturing abroad. Thank you to the teams who entered our Village Quest on Saturday 21st August. Despite uncertain weather, people turned out to follow the clues around the village trail set by Jo and Peter Nordan. Those who participated helped St Mary's kick start some much-needed fundraising following these many months of inactivity due to lockdown. We'll look at running another mystery trail next year and hope for better weather.

Thank you also to the army of volunteers who supported our clean-up of the church and churchyard on Saturday July 10th. It was so heartening to see people from the wider village community coming along to support the regular churchgoers in giving St Mary's a brilliant spring clean inside and out. The Lady Chapel and the vestry have been cleared of clutter, essential repairs made, woodwork polished and bugs flushed out of the 'piscina' in the sanctuary thanks to Peter Norden and his extra large drill. Jo Nordan has made a lovely new cover for the Lady Chapel altar. The side pews have been unscrewed and more space has been created in the Lady Chapel. Outside, trees and bushes were cut back and graves tidied. All looks so much better after the months of pandemic. It was a truly cooperative effort and was much appreciated by all and especially by the families who subsequently brought children for Baptism in the weeks following.

A number of our 'locals' are rightly expressing their concern about the future of St Mary's. It is true that our church is in dire straits financially. The urgent repairs needed to the porch, let alone the major structural repairs to the south aisle are unaffordable without the aid of grants and the increased running costs, especially the increase in the Church of England's 'parish share' which we must pay to the Diocese each year to sustain ministry, is placing an almost intolerable burden on our small but committed congregation who work so hard to keep St Mary's afloat. I know that so many of you in the village feel secure at present in the knowledge that our church is there when you need it, especially in marking those important times - Baptisms, weddings and funerals. By supporting our fundraising initiatives, you are helping to keep St Mary's available for these significant life events now and into the future. It'll take some sort of miracle to get the funds to repair the south aisle and have the entire church safe for a full congregation given the competition nationwide for a slice of grant money.



Parish Council Notes

Planning:

You may be aware that Dignity Funerals had made an application for a Crematorium to be built in a ten-hectare plot at the north-western end of the Mill Farm triangle. This had initially been refused by Breckland District Council for a variety of reasons, such as impact on the environment and landscape, need etc. Dignity appealed the decision and the matter was put before the Planning Inspectorate. The appeal was heard over four days and the Planning Inspector decided against the appeal. Dignity then had the opportunity to take their case to a higher authority but have not done so and are now outside the deadline for that action.

There has also been an application, made on behalf of the Mobile Phone Network Three, to erect a 20-metre-high mast for their 5G network. The site they had selected was near the telephone kiosk in Hereward Way, next to the shop. The land is owned by Breckland District Council, but they had not been approached by the network. The application went to Breckland District Council Planning and has now been refused. The applicant does have a right to appeal the decision but have yet to do so.

Litter Picking:

With the lifting of some of the COVID restrictions, we would like to organise a series of Litter Picks around the village and would appreciate your input as to where you consider they should happen. We still have several individuals who are regularly clearing litter in their neighbourhoods or when they are out walking or running. They have been issued with sacks from Breckland and have been advised as to where and when they should leave the sacks for collection by SERCO and that they should also let the Parish Council know so that they can pass the details on to Breckland District Council. This is necessary as there have been instances where individuals have put out their own domestic waste in black bags either in, or by, litter bins. This is actually "Fly Tipping" and if the waste is traced back to a given individual, they could incur a large fine.

Play Equipment:

The Parish Council has successfully made applications for grants to replace some of the equipment in the play enclosure on the Recreation Ground. Hopefully this will be happening in the not-too-distant future. We are also having some work done at the entrance to the car park on the Recreation Ground. This has become necessary as the matting has lifted and become a trip hazard to pedestrians and it will also cause vehicles to slow down in order to access the car park.

<u>Autumn Gardening. 🗙 🕻</u>

Hasn't it got noticeably more like Autumn than Summer early this year? The nights are noticeably drawing in, and the mornings are damp and cooler. Paul and I have already started our autumn clearance in our own garden a few weeks ago, and the gaps created have been filled from all of the lovely autumnal hardy plant stock we have in store now.

The trend of wildlife gardening has been (rightly) ever more popular in 2021. With many people choosing leaving areas of their garden 'wild' for insects. However, there are many of us who's gardens are too small to leave a "messy" area and our overwhelming desire as gardeners is to tame our patch. That doesn't mean that you can't still do your bit for pollinating insects as many non-native flowering plants within the garden offer beautiful floral displays in the landscape, as well as serve as essential sources of pollen and nectar needed by insects.

Bumblebees, solitary bees, butterflies and many other pollinators emerge when the weather warms up, but pollen and nectar can be hard to come by. Many insect species have been hibernating since autumn, and when they emerge, they need food for energy. Hoverflies, butterflies and hibernating bees such as bumblebees and solitary bees will come out at the first sign of warmer weather - this can be any time from February to April. Some species of bee, such as honeybees meanwhile don't hibernate, so they will become more active and start collecting nectar as soon as your spring flowers arrive.

Though often overlooked when planning a pollinator garden, spring bulbs are hardy and reliable, and among the very first flowers to bloom in late winter and into early spring. Choosing varieties that are rich in both nectar and pollen will be a lifeline to pollinators as these early blooming flowers ensure that bees are able to feed before other native nectar sources are readily available. September is the best month to purchase and plant spring flowering bulbs.

One of the first to flower is Crocus (although technically classed as a corm) Flowering as early as February they are very attractive to queen bumblebees, honey and solitary bees, and even the odd hoverfly. Bees can see the colour purple more clearly than any other colour, so it's no surprise that most of the bulbs on this list are purple. Chionodoxa, commonly known as glory of the snow, bloom in very early spring. These hardy, carefree bulbs are excellent for naturalizing. Planted beneath trees or shrubs, or even right in the lawn, they will multiply readily and spread a ripple of early spring colour through your garden.

Other bee-friendly bulbs to plant now include grape hyacinths, winter aconites and snowdrops (although winter aconites and snowdrops are often more successful when planted "in the green" in spring). Later (but equally useful) bee bulbs include Alliums, Fritillaries and English bluebells.

Planting bulbs in containers is an easy way to ensure you don't miss their colourful displays, especially if they are on your front path, or next to the back door on your patio. Bulbs can be layered in pots to flower over a long season and by combining bulbs you'll not only create eyecatching pots you'll also attract different pollinators too.

Then in spring, take time to watch the first, hungry bees come to your garden, they remind us summers on its way!

Once you planted your bulbs it's a good idea to mulch the soil with either a conditioner or bark chippings. Not only will this help keep down weed growth, it will insulate your plant roots protecting them from the worst of the winter weather.

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A FEW MORE OF MY MEMORIES By John Holledge

When I was about 7 years old, there was this postman who rode his bike loaded with letters and small parcels up to Weeting to deliver round the village. Unfortunately, he was a heavy smoker and would consume Wills Woodbines one after the other. On a cold, frosty morning he could be heard coughing as he pedalled up from Brandon railway crossing to Weeting.

My grandfather, (Dick Farrington), used to have rope bird scarers and I used to cut off the cartridges to use them separately - they were great! I stuffed one into a big cabbage growing in my grandad's garden, lit it up and retired to a great distance to watch the result. A few moments later, Grandad came to cut a cauliflower growing alongside the cabbages and, as he bent down to cut the stalk, there was a tremendous bang. The poor man nearly jumped out of his skin - he was not best pleased! The cabbage was completely obliterated with only the stalk remaining. Grandad was flabbergasted - he knew it was me and I got some advice on what he would do if I ever did it again.

Life was hard in those days, especially for the people that worked on the land. The weather could be appalling with freezing cold wind, rain and frost. The women would wait on the green, (no bus shelter then) waiting to be picked up by farm transport, dressed in their warmest clothes topped by old army great coats, wheat sacks tied round the middle by binder string, or a belt if they had one, woolly hats and wellies. They carried food for the day and a bottle of cold tea and a beet hook for topping and tailing the sugar beet - a back breaking job. I remember some of the women, Avis Bailey, Nell Brown, Pansy Branch, Kath Grass and Violet Amos. They were always smiling and full of life. Avis and Nelly lived in The Row, Pansy and Kath lived at Park View and Violet lived in Main Road. Sorry if I have forgotten anyone's relations.

We had a lot of snow when I was young and, if the roads became blocked by drifting snow, a ploughing blade would be hooked behind a farm tractor and adjusted to the width of the road. Sometimes we would tie our sledges to it and got pulled round the village. Whilst we were on the snow it was good fun, but if you came to a bit of road with little or no snow, the sledge would grind along and break the string and that was the end of our free ride. Of course, there was nowhere near as much traffic on the roads then as there is today.

Later on, we formed a youth club and that is where I met Patricia Brooks who later became my wife. We have lived in the village all our married life, in the Post Office cottage for 4 years, then to Sequioa for 8 years and finally we had our currant home built in 1976, which just happens to be between our two previous homes. We are now both retired and on 3rd August we celebrated our 57th wedding anniversary. We have a daughter, Elizabeth and son, Nicholas. After reading all my memories my wife says that she is glad our son did not take after me!



I cannot make much jiggy-jig...you come see my wife!" I quickly responded, "Piezcyek, go and see Dr Perry. He has tablets that make you go jiggy-jig lots of times, then you keep Danuta happy!" Well, I have never seen any one scramble for the bicycle as he did and then pedal as fast as he could towards Brandon! I phoned the Doctor and told him Piezcyek was on his way to see him to get some "jiggy-jig pills. His response was "You b*****d, I've just put him off inviting me to entertain Danuta! Now I have got to think what I can give him!" (This was in the days before Viagra etc.)

Both Piezcyek and Danuta have long since passed away, but they are always in my memories of the community I once policed.

Hazardous waste



Waste is hazardous if it can cause harm to humans or the environment and includes any waste that needs specialist disposal.

We don't normally take these items at our recycling centres, however we hold annual free household hazardous waste days (amnesties) when we do accept certain hazardous waste items.

These are for residents disposing of household hazardous waste only and not for any business, group or other organisation.

The next household hazardous waste days will take place in September and October 2021:

- 11 and 12 September King's Lynn
- 18 and 19 September Dereham
- 25 and 26 September Thetford

Your local district, borough or city council may offer a hazardous waste collection, but they might charge you for this service.

WEETING VILLAGE HALL NEWS

It's been a difficult time over the last 18 months but glad to say the hall is now open again and most of the clubs and groups have started back and are in full swing with their activities, making full use of the newly decorated and spruced up hall.

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Using The Village Defibrillator

Hopefully, everyone is aware that we have a defibrillator in Weeting that is kept in the old red telephone box near the Post Office shop in Hereward Way. Originally, it had been sited on the wall of the Village Hall but moved to its current location when the telephone box became available several years ago.



It is a very sophisticated piece of equipment, but it is simplicity itself to use as it gives instructions all the way along about what you have to do and it will only produce an electrical charge to a patient if its computer system identifies there is need to do so. Therefore, do not be afraid to deploy it if you believe a patient may be having a heart attack.

What you need to do in an emergency:


- Dial 999 to report the emergency and request an ambulance. They will ask you if the patient is breathing and what has happened. If the patient is unconscious without a discernible pulse, a heart attack is likely and they should give you the code that you will need to open the locked cabinet where the defibrillator is kept. (Write this code down, if you can, in order to avoid forgetting it!)
- 2. Do Not leave the patient in order to fetch the defibrillator yourself if you are on your own. Try to contact someone quickly to fetch it for you, but if no one is available, the next step is vital.



 Position the patient on their back, preferably on the floor as you need to have a solid surface behind them and

commence CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation) as instructed by the Emergency Service. Keep going until the Paramedics arrive and can take over from you. At this point they may ask you to fetch the defibrillator.

Inside the locked cabinet you will find the defibrillator in its bright orange carry case. Included in the case are the electrode pads (marked 'PULL'), but you will also need to take the small green bag that is in the cabinet. This contains surgical gloves, a razor, tweezers and swabs. A strip light comes on when you open the cabinet so that you are able to find everything, but please do not try to remove this



Once the emergency has been resolved, it is important to return the defibrillator to the locked cabinet as soon as possible. Please return the green bag and the 'wind-up' torch as well and make sure the cabinet is securely locked. The Parish Council need to be made aware that the equipment has been used in order for them to replace any items that are now missing; i.e. electrode pads and



the contents of the green bag. Please note that the items have to be purchased by the Parish Council and are not replaced free of charge. Replacement sets cost about £60.

Failure to inform the Parish Council that the defibrillator has been deployed means that it cannot be used if another emergency occurs. We do not hold spare items as they have a shelf life and we therefore have to order them which takes a few days.

Performing CPR while waiting for medical assistance can greatly increase a person's chance of survival from cardiac arrest.

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Weeting's Hidden Treasure The Stump Cross

The upright stone is the base of a mediaeval wayside cross. After its top was lost it became known as Stump Cross. It probably dates from the 1300's and would originally have stood around 12 feet (4m) high with a decorated cross on the top. It is carved from Barnack stone which was probably transported by river to Brandon from a quarry near Peterborough.



It was sited in a field north of Weeting beside a green way, called locally Walsingham Way, so called because (it is said) that it was used by pilgrims on the way to the Lady of Walsingham. The cross was placed on a hill in order to

have the greatest prominence in the landscape. Some 3,500 years earlier the Bronze Age people of the area were building dramatic burial mounds on the hill to achieve the same result. Before trees were planted in the early 1800's, the hill was a windswept heath. The mediaeval traveller approaching it would have seen the cross and the burial mounds silhouetted along the ridge of the skyline.

In 1538 the commissioners of King Henry VIII destroyed the shrine at Walsingham and pilgrimages stopped. It may have been at this time that the cross on the top was removed, or perhaps later in 1643 when parliament ordered that all crosses should be pulled down.

To find the stump cross today, travel north out of Weeting towards Methwold and turn right onto the Cranwich Road. You will need to park the car and walk along fire ride 58, going past the pumping station and you will find a notice board on the right-hand side of the track with information about the cross. You do have to walk between the trees for several yards as the cross is not immediately visible from the track. The walk is fairly easy and great if you have a dog, with lots of birdsong along the way.

The plantation is called Mount Ephraim if you look for it on a local map, named thus after an area of densely wooded hills in Palestine described in the Bible.
