School Report



It is amazing to think that we are heading towards the end of the first full year back in school for all our children in over 2 years! We have continued to reintroduce lots of favourite and familiar routines as the term has progressed. It was wonderful to see the children, families and Mother Joan come together for our Easter Service. Each class



contributed to the retelling of the Easter Story through drama, art and storytelling. It was amazing to see how confidently the children shared the performances and how much they enjoyed doing this.

This term, Chestnut Class have been learning about "Kings and Queens". This week Chestnut Class have been exploring their new theme "Kings and Queens". The children have learnt about Queen Elizabeth II and found out that she has been Queen for 70 years even longer than Miss Hardie and Mrs Powell have been at school! The children learnt that the Queen wears a crown, some of the time, and sits on a throne. We looked at the Throne Room in Buckingham Palace and Grace decided that it looked very comfy and that the Queen could do her knitting there! The children have learnt about the Union Jack and the Royal Standard and that the Royal Standard only flies at Buckingham Palace when the Queen is actually living there.





Bobby and Leo created Buckingham Palace using the Duplo and included a garden for the corgis and a throne for Queen Elizabeth.





The children have painted portraits of the Queen wearing her crown and used sequins to represent the jewels.

They have learnt that the crown was passed down to Queen Elizabeth II when her dad died. The children thought that Queen Elizabeth would be a bit happy and a bit sad about becoming Queen. They went onto learn that Prince Charles is the Queen's eldest son and that he is 'next in line to the throne' and will become King next. The children learnt that a throne is a special chair that the King or Queen sits on during special occasions. We looked at the throne that Queen Elizabeth sits on and recreated it to make mini thrones and our very own life size thrones.





Mrs Powell was pronounced Queen Powell and was invited to sit on the throne! Chestnut Class decided that Miss Hardie was crowned Princess Hardie and will ascend to the throne after Mrs Powell!







This term, Beech Class have been reading the Jungle Book and have been working towards writing setting descriptions of the Cold Lairs. We have been learning how to use comparative and superlative adjectives, as well as similes, and exciting adjectives to create a picture in the mind of the reader.

In Maths, we have been looking at Time: recognising how to tell the time to o'clock, half past, quarter to and quarter past. We have also learnt how to measure duration.





In Geography, we have been learning about Northern Europe and now we all want to go on a school trip to the fjords and see the Northern Lights!

In Science, we used a microscope to see how it makes small things look much bigger. We found out that the smallest building block of nearly everything is called an atom.

We have also had lots of fun this term raising money towards our school trip by selling our cakes at a bake sale.





Elm class have been studying the Stuarts this term and have brilliantly discussed many possible reasons for why the English Civil War broke out. They then discovered that Civil War broke out in 1642 between the Cavaliers and the Roundheads after the King ignored parliament and raised taxes. Elm have discussed in great detail if King Charles deserved his trial and execution. Elm class have also been investigating if Oliver Cromwell was a hero, tyrant or misunderstood through persuasive writing and posters.

Last term we had an amazing response to our Books for Schools collecting. We successfully collected enough tokens to select £100 worth of books for our school library. Thank you to all our friends and families who helped.




Sports Equipment for Schools

Porch repair

I'm hoping [fingers crossed] to apply before June for a grant for the remainder of the money we need to finally repair the Porch. The Elvis night plus some of the smaller fundraisers and donations have helped enormously and we now have about half the money we need, so I'm hopeful that we can secure the rest and proceed with this work during the summer. It's long awaited!

South Aisle restoration

At the beginning of May, I had a visit from the 'interim' Archdeacon [a kind of middle management person in the C of E who deals with building matters], Nicholas Thistlewaite, a retired priest from Cambridge. Nicholas has a great deal of experience with proposed Church building works as he continues to be a long-term member of the Diocesan Advisory Committee which oversees the care of church buildings. He visited St Mary's at my invitation to look at the South Aisle and to advise on moving forward with that mammoth project. Hopefully during early summer, we will have a in depth site meeting with Nicholas, the Head of the DAC in Ely Diocese, Geoffrey Hunter and the architect Ruth Blackman to suggest a staged way to progress those works. Undertaking those repairs will be time consuming and costly but it will be helpful if it is possible to break the work down into 'chunks' that could be more financially viable. I'll keep you updated on progress in the Autumn edition of WVL.

You will all by now have noticed that there is one of them speed thingy's popping up at various selected sites around the village! It is a SAM2 that lights up with your speed if you are close to the limit and if, over it, flashes slow down! It also counts the number of vehicles that pass it, recording the speed as they do so. No other details of the vehicle are recorded. In the time that we have recorded data, analysis would indicate that there may be well in excess of 4,000 vehicle movements passing through the village on any given day! Obviously, as more data is collected, we will be able to firm up these statistics which we will share with our County and District Councillors, Highways and the Police.

The Breckland Mobile Food Store (see more details on page 14 of this magazine) will be visiting Weeting every Friday between 10.30 and 11.30am and will be situated at the back of the lorry park beside the bowls club. This is a brilliant initiative on the part of Breckland and is proving to be a huge asset, having already increased the number of villages served from 10 to 11 within its first week.

Regarding the Playing field, the new equipment has been installed for several weeks now and is proving popular. We are looking towards applying for funding for other equipment and would like some ideas, so please contact the clerk or any of the councillors with your suggestions. Sadly, we haven't the space for a skatepark or zip wire, but all other suggestions would be welcome. We are also looking towards replacing the fence around the junior play-area with a metal type as the palings of the current wooden one are being either pulled off or broken and the posts will also have to be replaced in time.

We would also like to thank those folk who, when they are out and about, collect the litter that they come across and dispose of it. Thank you so much for helping to keep the village clean and tidy.

Lastly, the Parish Council are sad to lose one of our valuable members, Sarah O'Donnell, due to family and work commitments, and would like to give her our best wishes and say a big thank you for all the effort and enthusiasm she gave during her time on the committee.

Summer Gardening



How time flies! It is June already, so let's hope summer is here and we can enjoy those long, warm, sunny days! Here at P&R Garden Supplies, we are full of bedding plants ready for planting out now and the risk of frost has passed, so we can all stop watching the weather so intently.

As we all celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee this June, it is also celebration time here at P&R Garden Supplies as we have been trading for 20 years – it seems like yesterday! One thing that the Royal family are known for is their love of the environment and tackling environmental issues. This article is something I have written about before, (January 2015 to be precise), **Peat.**

Peat became hugely popular with both commercial and amateur gardeners in the mid 1970's due to its stability, lightness, predictability and low cost. Before this, gardeners either made their own compost or bought readymade loam compost (John Innes). Peat remains the mostly widely used planting medium in the UK and around 70% of all peat extracted is used in horticulture.

The problem with peat: To meet the demand, UK peat bogs were drained and destroyed resulting in peatland becoming one of the UK's most threatened habitats. Because of commercial extraction 98% of the UK's lowland raised peatbogs, one of our rarest and most vulnerable habitats, have been lost. There are just 6,000 hectares in pristine or near-natural condition left. Each of these bogs holds its own unique community of plant and animal species and peatlands contain one of the world's most important carbon stores.

So why do gardeners still use peat-based products? It's estimated that as many as 90% of gardeners don't realise that compost labelled as "multi-purpose" contains peat unless it is clearly labelled as peat free. Keen gardeners tend to use a compost brand they know and trust.

At the end of the day, all gardeners want a bag of compost that will perform well. The government had originally planned to stop all retail sales of peat-based composts by 2020, but we all know what happened in 2020 and that date has now changed to 2024. However, manufacturers have invested millions of pounds into creating new formulations that are either entirely peat-free or peat reduced. Formulations that previously contained high levels of peat have been replaced, so when you visit our store, (or any other), you will find that the compost on offer this year is noticeably of a very different texture, being much coarser and more fibrous. This isn't a bad thing and your plants will thrive, as this aids aeration and plant root growth. Avid watchers of Gardener's World will know that Monty Don uses peat-free composts for all tasks in his garden.

Top Tips for Summer Gardening:

- Summer prune stone-fruit trees (pruning now prevents silver leaf disease).
- Sow seeds of bi-annuals, including Sweet Williams, Forget-menots and Wallflowers for flowering next spring.
- If any of your hanging basket plants have become leggy, trim the excess away to encourage new bushier growth.
- Pinch out side shoots from cordon tomato plants.
- Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds.
- Keep on top of watering.
- Regularly pick vegetables such as cucumbers and runner beans to keep them from cropping.
- Apply a high potash fertiliser to tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers and summer annuals to keep them producing fruit and flowers.

However, in summer the most important job to do is to enjoy your garden; heady scents, glorious colours, an abundance of fruits and vegetables and hopefully more sunshine. What could be more enjoyable and satisfying than surveying the results of your hard work throughout the year?



More Memories Of My Work Days by John Holledge

When I worked at TH Nice's garages in Thetford as an HGV fitter, we had a large used car lot run by two salesmen, Brian (Stitcher) Foster and Charlie Burmah, the latter being a retired heavyweight wrestler. In his office he had photos of himself in his wrestling attire, standing with one foot on his opponent whom he had just beaten and with one hand punching the air. If anyone complained about a car that they had purchased, Charlie always took them into his office and sat them down where they could see the photos. "Is that you Mr Burmah?" they would say. "Oh yes", he would reply. "Now, what is your problem?" At that moment the atmosphere would change, the customer would alter their attitude becoming rather subdued and they would speak very nicely to Charlie!

One day Charlie came into my workshop holding some car keys. "John where are you?" he shouted. "Over here" I said. He came over and said, "Give us a pound". I asked what for and he said, "Never mind, just give us a pound". So, I gave him a pound and he gave me the keys and said, "See that Ford van over there? That's yours now as I don't want it". "What, for a pound?" I said. He told me yes, so I took it home and sold it to my brother-in-law who used it for many years without any trouble.

Brian (Stitcher) Foster did not have customers, he had victims as his nickname suggests. He once took a Wolseley car in part exchange and it was put on the end of the car lot near the crossroads. It did not sell, so after 4 months we repainted it. It looked very smart and was put back on the lot. However, the next day a cattle float failed to take the corner, toppled over squashing the car, burst open and pigs ran out and up the Bury Road. It took all afternoon to catch them. Needless to say, the car went for scrap.

It was about this time that Norfolk Highways and Thetford Borough Council decided to widen the road past St Mary's Church and divert to the old A11 at the crossroads. In their excavations at the edge of the graveyard, the workmen dug up 3 skeletons that had been buried in shallow graves. With no more ado, they threw the bones onto the heaps of dirt that they had excavated, on top of which they pushed in three red and white marker poles. On top of these they placed the skulls with little pieces of cardboard fixed to them upon which was written the names, PIP, SQUEAK and WILFRED. The local people went potty and called the police who came and told the workmen to take them down, which they did. I don't know what they did with the bones; perhaps they reburied them close to the church. Some people thought it funny, but most did not.

In the 60's it would snow a lot during the winter, sometimes 150 - 200cms. Our toilet block, such as it was, had a flat roof, in the middle of which was a clear corrugated plastic skylight. This would get covered with snow and it made the toilets very dark, so one of our apprentice lads, Rolfy, climbed on the roof with a broom to clear the snow away. Unbeknown to him, our paint spraying expert, the honourable Ian Arbothnot Shearer, had just sat upon the throne to begin his morning ablutions and to check the runners in the Kempton Park races. I stepped out of the workshop to check on a vehicle when a snowball hit me on the head. "Gotcha", said Rolfy and bent down to make another one. I grabbed a handful of snow and threw it at him, but he saw it coming and side stepped it. A moment later he disappeared from sight with a loud cry of "OH", immediately followed by a cry of "Bloody hell!" I ran to the toilet block only to see that the honourable lan Arbothnot Shearer had been joined by Rolfy, a broom, the corrugated plastic and several pounds of freezing snow. To make matters worse, the toilet door opened inwards and we couldn't open it because of the compacted snow. Rolfy couldn't get up as he was stuck on Shearer, who in turn was not pleased with the situation as he could not get off the toilet, being covered in broken bits of plastic, snow and, of course, Rolfy! We managed to extract them both by removing the hinges and breaking the lock.

I tell you, I have never laughed so much in my life and, what is more, none of the horses that Shearer had picked won!

- Reduce Food Waste by using surplus food that might otherwise have gone to landfill, The Breckland Mobile Food Store will also have a strong and positive environmental impact.



Castle Danger

Many of you will be aware that English Heritage have had a comprehensive network of scaffolding erected around Weeting Castle in readiness for repair work to be undertaken.

However, there have been several reports from

residents of people entering the fenced off area, climbing the scaffolding and throwing down more stonework and scaffold planks. This is a very dangerous activity as well as causing further destruction to such an ancient

building. It may be several weeks or even months before the conservation builders start work, so there is potential for severe damage to the property or injury to the guilty parties if they have an accident or fall. English Heritage have asked the community to contact Norfolk Police by dialling 999 if any further miscreants are seen on the scaffolding.


