#### A New Trod

Anyone walking along the main road towards Saxon Place will have noticed that a new trod has been created to provide a safer crossing place.

There had been a dropped curb on the opposite side ever since the old path had been laid, but there was only a grassy verge to cross over to.



In addition, the workmen straightened up the concrete posts that were on the corner. These posts are of historic relevance because they were placed there to mark the entrance to the tank park (now Saxon Place) during WW2 and would have been painted white so that they could be seen in low light conditions.

The cost of the trod was covered 50/50 by Weeting Parish Council and a grant under the Joint Partnerships Scheme from Norfolk County Council.

By the way, a "Trod" in Norfolk parlance is a pathway.

This term we have been able to celebrate fully, school traditions that have encouraged the children to think about others, an important part of our Christian ethos.



The school was turned into a "Children in Need Spotacular". Who knew there could be so many different sized and coloured spots across the school. There must have been a lot of creative sessions going on at home this week. We've seen Pudsey face painting, spotty dressing gowns, socks and tops.





The whole school and community came together on the morning of 11th November to commemorate Remembrance Day. Our worship was expertly led by the children from Oak Class who shared their specially commissioned poem and prayer that they had written. Their choice of words was very poignant and were beautifully presented.

#### Chestnut Class

This term has had a real outdoors feel to it. We have



been very lucky that the weather has been kind to us! A huge first school experience for the children was when we went on our first school trip to the Sandringham Estate. We had an amazing Forest School session where we explored potion making with



Forest School session where we explored potion making with flowers and herbs, went on a fairy hunt and ate popcorn around the camp fire. We even found a giant beetle on our minibeast hunt. We had a lot of fun trying to work out how to get in, and stay in the



We followed our interest in pumpkins and listened to story "Pumpkin Soup". We made a list of all the ingredients and equipment that the characters in the story used and then

learnt how to follow a recipe to make our very own pumpkin soup. We had to scoop out all the pumpkin seeds which





was very tricky as the flew out of it, and some even landed in our hair! We had to use a knife to cut a lot of potatoes, pumpkin and carrots. Using

a knife meant we had to concentrate and look at what we were cutting!

We had an amazing turn out at our Family Soup Share afternoon. Everybody enjoyed the home-made pumpkin soup and the accompanying bread, bread sticks and garlic bread went down a \_\_\_\_\_\_



treat! A huge thank you to all your kind donations which the children have chosen to spend on equipment for a brand-new potion station. A very special thank you to Ryan's family who have donated a sink unit and to Mabel's family who have kindly



offered to build us our very own potion station.

Our transport theme this term provided us with an opportunity to learn about how to keep safe as we travel. The children learnt how to keep themselves safe crossing a road, by remembering the "stop, look and listen" rule. They practised crossing safely on a pretend road at the front of school and learnt how important it is to



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wear fluorescent clothing so that drivers can see them easily. Back in class the children created a mini roadscape complete with pelican crossings, zebra crossings and lollipop sticks to show the different ways of crossing a road safely.



## School Report




#### **Beech Class**

In Beech Class we have read the books Owl Babies and Aladdin. We learnt to retell the familiar story of Owl Babies and how to write to represent the numbers using the sentences correctly. We then learnt some new vocabulary and unpicked the story of Aladdin.

The provided the story of Aladdin.

In Science, we have been learning all about the human body including the five senses and Helen Keller who was both deaf and blind. In English, we wrote a non-chronological report about the bones, organs and keeping healthy. Beech class have also enjoyed their first trip of the year to Banham Zoo, linked to our topic about animals and habitats.



During Geography sessions we have been learning all about maps of familiar places, ordinance survey symbols and drawing our own maps. We are beginning to discover History, and finding out how we know how history happened by using diaries, archaeologists and fossils.

In Religious Education, we are learning why it is important to welcome others, how to partake in good deeds and be good citizens, and discussing various values.

During Art sessions, we have been learning about primary and secondary colours. We are now beginning to experiment with lines to create images.

#### Elm Class

The children have discovered that the human skeleton inside our bodies is called an endoskeleton. They also loved learning all the major



bones names through a skeleton song and enjoyed stopping and discussing that bone's specific function. Later, the children discovered, through feeling and moving their own bones, that they are connected by joints and at each joint, our bones are connected by strong tissues called ligaments.



Throughout English this term Elm have tackled, simple, compound and complex sentences and have used speech, direct speech, expanded noun phrases, prepositions, adjectives, nouns, pronouns and paragraphs in combination to create their final pieces of work which was a short narrative with bursts of speech.

In PHSE the children have explored the need for rules at home and at school. They have discussed in great detail why homes are different to one another and came to the conclusion that all families are different

and no parent is the same as we all have different values in life. Elm also discussed that school and homes share the same value for rules which is to keep us safe.



Most recently in Maths, Elm have been applying their knowledge of times tables to represent the numbers using the grouping method, repeated addition as well as arrays. This has led Elm to solve a range of multiplications word problems, as well as division problems using their ever-progressing ability to use the inverse of an operation.



#### Oak Class

As we begin the run in to the end of the Autumn term it is great to have the opportunity to share some of our learning. Our Literacy work this term has been based on the book – "The 1000 Year Old Boy" by Ross Welford. The children have written biographies about the author, narratives using dialogue, explanation texts and will conclude by writing a balanced argument on whether Alfie should tell Sangeeta his secret.

In Maths, after focussing mainly on the 4 operations, (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division), we are now moving on to fractions, where we will be covering comparing and ordering, equivalence and simplifying, then addition and subtraction.

Throughout our Primary Knowledge Curriculum units, we have covered special sense involving longitude and latitude and are now investigating Mountains in Geography. In History, we began by looking at the Early British Empire and are now moving onto the Transatlantic Slave trade.

In Art, the children completed their unit on Style by designing their own chair in the 'Modernism Style'







#### The Nest

In the Nest, we have started each morning and afternoon session with Sensory Circuits. We enjoy these sessions and they have been based on a few minutes of alerting: this will be activities which make the head direction change rapidly. This is followed with a few minutes based on organising: these are complex sequences of movements, for example, trails. The sessions end with calming activities.

Our RE learning was focused on, 'Why is belonging to God and the church family important to Christians?' We thought about how to make others feel welcome and about how we feel when we belong. We loved using Lego to make models of places where we belong. We thought lots about Baptism/ Christening and the importance of these.

In English, we loved reading Owl Babies. We drew pictures of owls and found out lots of facts. We also enjoyed the story: Aladdin. We thought about different characters and settings and wrote some instructions for how to marry a princess.

In Maths, we have completed lots of counting activities. We have been counting both forwards and backwards. We have compared different numbers and have been trying hard to develop our understanding of addition and subtraction.

In Science, we studied the human body where we found out lots about the parts of the body associated with our senses. We thought about what could happen if people have problems with their senses for example blindness and deafness.

In Art, we had lots of fun finding out about the colour wheel and experimented with primary and secondary colours. In Geography, we enjoyed working on compass directions. We made our own maps and keys and considered the features of our school.









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## School Report



We have welcomed lots of new children to the Preschool this term, it has been lovely getting to know them and watching them settle in.

This half term we started with talking about fireworks and bonfire night, the children loved sharing their



stories and creating their own fireworks using paint. We also shared the CBeebies "Poppy" video on Remembrance Day, the children thought the soldiers where very brave and wanted to create their own poppies to say thank you. The children have also taken part in Children in





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#### **BRECKLAND CATS PROTECTION**

Breckland Cats Protection consists of a small band of volunteers of about 12 people. Some are fund raisers, some foster cats or kittens, we have a co-ordinator, treasurer, neutering officer, homing and welfare office, but we need more volunteers, so that we can help more cats. We are particularly short of people who can foster. If you have a spare bedroom and have the time, you could help us to help more cats. We pay all



expenses, so it doesn't cost you anything except your time. We pay mileage and provide food and litter. You would need to be able to drive, to take a cat to our vets in Thetford if it needed treatment or neutering.

In Weeting we have a problem with a feral colony of cats. Before Covid, we trapped, neutered and returned about 40-50 cats, we took their kittens and socialised them and homed them. Behind every feral cat there is a human. True feral cats are the offspring of a stray or abandoned domestic cats.

In most cases, adult feral cats cannot be domesticated or re-homed as they have not been socialised when young and become too used to living wild. Our branch trap, neuter and return adult cats back onto their territory. Very young kittens can be domesticated through good socialisation with humans before they become too used to living wild.

If you live in Weeting and have the time, we desperately need your help. We are trying to cope with the original colony, but more un-neutered cats have joined the group and these need trapping, taking to our vets in Thetford to be neutered and returned to their territory. We would pay mileage, so that you are not out of pocket, but we don't have anyone who lives close by to help us. We can deal with the situation more quickly, if we have people to help us, otherwise it will be a long-drawn-out process and all the time, with un-neutered cats, the population of feral cats is growing.

Remember, cats are protected by law and purposefully killing or harming a cat constitutes an offence. Don't forget these cats didn't ask to be here, but they are here because someone down the line, abandoned their un-neutered cat and turned it into a feral.

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

#### Play Area on Jubilee Field

Many of you will have noticed that the fencing around the play area on the Jubilee Field has been removed. The wooden fence and gates had been deteriorating for some time and the Parish Council had tried to keep up with



repairs. However, several palings had been torn or kicked out lately and left nails or screws protruding and were therefore a potential hazard.



Replacement with metal railings that would be more resilient was found to be unaffordable (approximately £17,000) and a grant application was turned down. Therefore, due to the rotting condition of

the fencing, the

decision was made to remove it altogether. We will continue to make enquiries regarding possible alternatives, hopefully using recycled materials that will not rot (like the new benches around the village) and that we can afford without raising the Village Precept (our portion of your Council Tax). In the meantime, we aim to place a continuous barrier between the playground and the Village Hall car park to keep the two areas apart.



#### **Grandad's War Stories**

#### 1914 - 1918

During the Great War, my grandfather, Robert Farrington, was in the Somme battlefield where he laid narrow gauge railway track over muddy shell-holed ground. These had to be taken up and re-laid quite often as German artillery would get to know where they were and would shoot to destroy them. It was the steam locomotives that gave the game away as to where the tracks were because of the steam and smoke rising into the air. This could be seen up to 5 miles away, so the German gunners would aim at it, hoping to hit the train and, alas, they often did.



After one particularly severe bombardment, Grandfather was busy taking up, moving and replacing rails with about 20 other men, when all work stopped in order to watch a new-fangled flying machine circling

around overhead. It was quite the done thing to wave and shout greetings to the pilot as he flew by and not to shoot at the plane as it was not armed because the pilot was just spying and making notes on the progress of the repairs. The British army would also spy on the Germans in the same way and would not be shot at.

However, one particular day, the German spotter plane came over quite low and Grandad's best mate, Jack Potter, said, "What's he doing here again? I'll fix him!" and with that he let go one round with his rifle. No one knows whether he hit the plane or not, but when it came back the next time, the pilot leaned outside the cockpit and fired a single shot which narrowly missed Grandad and knocked the track spanner out of his hand. This may have been the first time a British soldier was shot at from an aeroplane – it certainly had never been heard of before that occasion. Shortly after this, German artillery would fire on British spotter planes marking the beginning of a new era of aerial warfare.

#### Grandad verses the Luftwaffe 1939/45 War

In the last war, Grandad was out shooting with his old friend, Fred Risbrook, on a field along the Hockwold Road. The day had not gone well and it was raining and very cold. Late in the afternoon when they were about to call it a day, they heard the sound of an aeroplane coming fast and low and moments later it appeared through the low cloud and coming straight towards them. "Lord, look at that," said Fred. "Yes," said Grandad, "but that's a German fighter!" and he immediately gave it both barrels, thinking that would be the end of it. But, no, the plane, an ME109, made a long turn to the left, flew out over Manor Road in Brandon and turned again, coming straight towards Grandad and Fred. They were loading their guns to have another go at it when there was a blast of machine gun fire from the plane. Fred nearly jumped out of his skin, lost his hat and dropped his gun in the mud, clogging up both barrels so he couldn't use it, also dropping his glasses. Grandad gave the plane another two barrels and then ran with Fred to the hedgerow to hide. The plane flew very low and the pilot waved goodbye. "Missed, you B----d! We showed him all that firing and he missed us!" shouted Grandad.

It was not until they got back to my grandad's old Morris 8 car that they found the pilot had not missed at all. The poor old car had three broken windows, eleven holes right through it and part of the steering wheel was missing. Amazingly, it still ran, so Grandad and Fred got into the car and drove home to have a stiff whisky each! They were very lucky to get away unscathed.

How I know all this is because ever since I was little, I used to sit with Grandad and Fred and they would tell me all about what happened to them when they were younger and, fortunately, I have a good memory.

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
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#### WEETING SPEED RECORDER UPDATE

The speed recorder is positioned at a series of sites throughout the village at 4-week intervals. The data recorded is vital for the ultimate safety of all Parishioners and allows analysis of the number of vehicles that pass through within the designated period and the speeds of vehicles.

In conclusion, the 16-week analysis shows **178,755** vehicle movements throughout the 4 sites, of which **151,915** vehicle movements remained within the speed limit. However – it is greatly concerning that **26,840** vehicles exceeded the speed limit within Weeting Village.

#### Winter Gardening



Another whirlwind of a year is coming to an end. 2022 started as it meant to go on with the warmest New Year's day on record, and since then every month has been warmer than average through 2022. A warmer than average Autumn has resulted in many gardening tasks either not being conducted, or being left very late in the season.

The garden shouldn't be out of bounds during winter. Plants are dormant and often us gardens head for hibernation too. Yet gardening at this time of year can be a joy, not just because it gets you outside and into nature, but because it gives you a perfect excuse to retreat from the festive fuss. Digging, weeding and raking the leaves will bring exercise into your routine, so go outdoors for some fresh air and keep your garden looking glorious!

Here's some of my 'must do' Winter tasks:

#### Prune your roses:

Most types of roses should be pruned in winter, before the leaves emerge in spring. A general rule with hybrid teas, floribunda and shrub roses is to reduce the height by half, creating a rounded, even shape. Remove any of the branches showing the three d's (dead, damaged, diseased). Follow your pruning with a good mulch of soil improver to protect the roots from winter frosts and to lock in moisture for the spring.

#### Plant bare-rooted trees and shrubs:

As long as the ground isn't frozen or waterlogged you can plant dormant bare rooted trees and shrubs. All bareroot means is that there is no soil around the roots of a plant when it is delivered. We are all familiar with some examples of bare root plants. For example, almost all flower bulbs are planted when they are dormant and have neither leaf nor root. The key word is dormant. All plants slow down in the winter as temperatures drop and light levels fall. Deciduous specimens (trees and shrubs that lose their leaves in winter) go to sleep completely and almost all cellular activity ceases. Because these plants are in "shut down" they have very little need for anything except sufficient dampness at the root to prevent desiccation and cell damage. Meaning they can be lifted from the ground and replanted in your garden without them even noticing!

#### Herbaceous Perennials:

Don't be too tidy! By leaving the old growth of perennials and grasses in situ until the spring you can help insects such as ladybirds survive the winter. It also gives the plant some protection should we have a harsh winter.

#### Welcome in the Spring:

Weather depending, from late January onwards our garden centre will be full of colourful primulas, bi-annuals and bulbs. We will also have seed potatoes and soft fruits to make a new start on your vegetable garden or allotment.

Whatever you are planning for your garden in 2023 Paul and I are always available to offer support and advice, as well as stocking fairly priced gardening products from the top manufacturers, and plants sourced year-round from the very best UK growers. Have a very merry Christmas.


## The Breckland Mobile Food Store in Weeting

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
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
